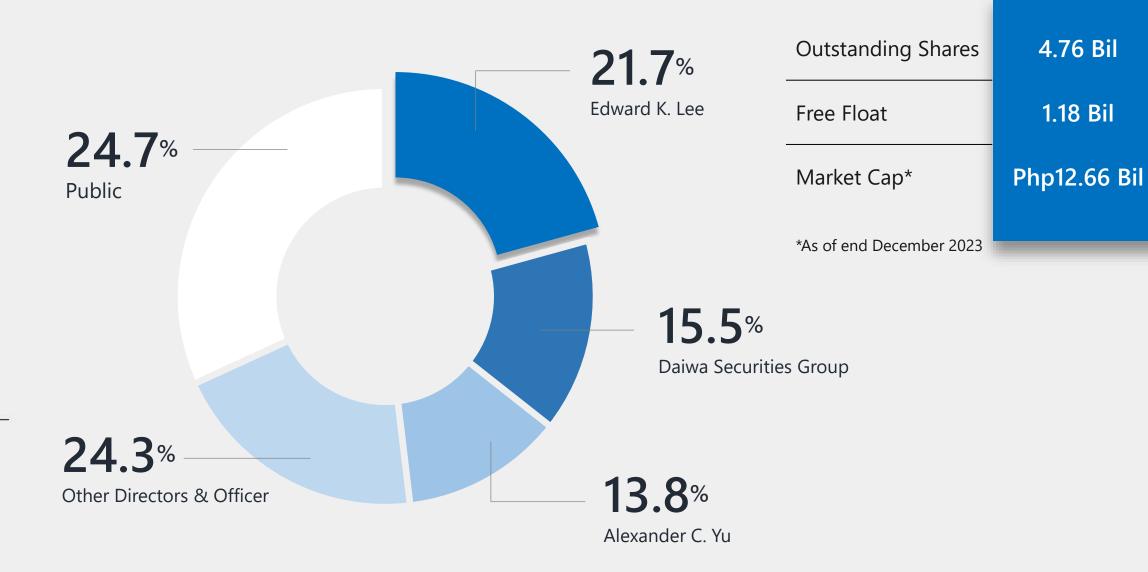

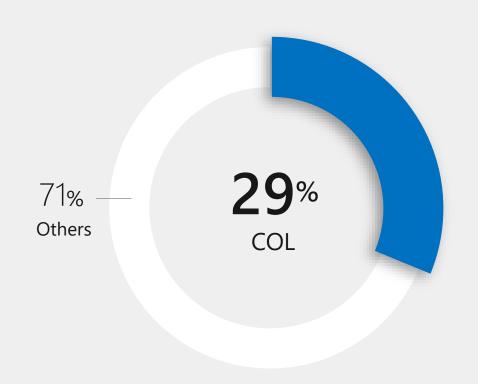

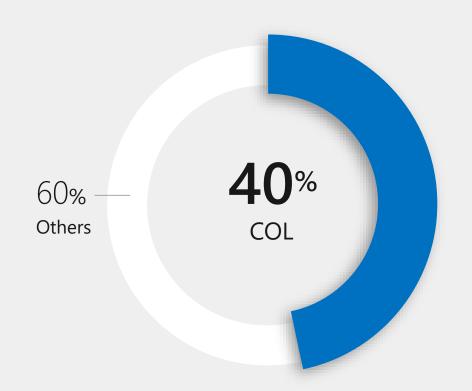


The Biggest Philippine Based Stockbroker

Total Online Accounts (as of 2022)







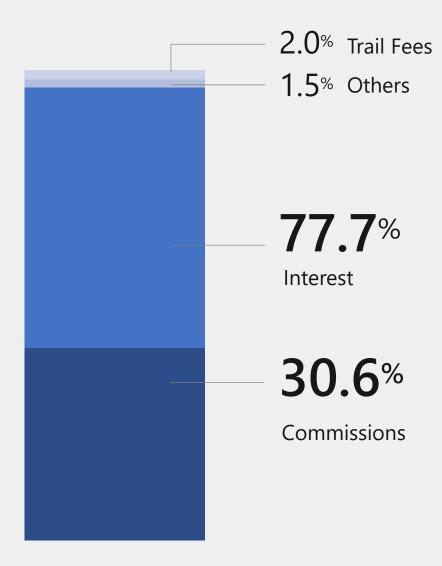
Bulk of Revenues Generated from Commissions and Interest

Commissions accounted for 30.6% of revenues.

Interest income from margin loans and cash placements accounted for 77.7% of revenues.

Trailer fees from the distribution of mutual funds accounted for 2.0% of revenues.

Key Operating Highlights

Positives

- 1. Net income jumped 73.6%
- 2. Higher interest income more than offset lower commission revenues
- 3. Client base continued to grow
- 4. MF net sales still positive despite challenging operating environment, leading to higher AUA

Negatives

- 1. Commission revenues fell sharply
- 2. Rank and market share in the PSE slipped
- 3. Total assets down



2023 Net Income +73.6% Y/Y

2023 net income jumped 73.6% to Php418.4 Mil as higher interest income offset lower commission revenues.

Pro forma consolidated revenues rose 32.2% to Php1.1 Bil largely due to the 110.6% increase in interest income to Php708.5 Mil. Commissions fell 26.3% due to lackluster trading volume.

Operating profits increased by a faster 75.1% to Php556.5 Mil as operating expenses were up by only 4.7%.

Taxes increased by 79.7%.

On a recurring basis, profits grew by 69.1% as COL booked a Php6.4 Mil loss on sale of investment securities last year.

Commissions Hurt by Weak Investor Interest

Revenues grew 32.2% despite lower commissions due to higher interest income.

Commission revenues fell by 26.3% to Php26.3 Mil as stocks suffered from weak investor interest. Note that average daily value turnover in the PSE fell by 16.9% to Php6.1 Bil, while value traded by local investors (which is COL's target market) fell by an even faster pace of 45.3%.

Trail fees also fell slightly, by 0.7% to Php22.0 Mil.

On the positive side, interest income jumped by 110.6% to Php708.5 Mil. This was largely due to the steep rise in interest rates, as the BSP raised benchmark rates by 450 basis points. Margin loans likewise increased.

Self-directed clients continued to account for the lion's share of total commission revenues at 77.7%.

Because of the significant increase in interest income, the share of core commission revenues and trailer fees fell to 32.6% of total revenues.

Controlled Growth of Expenses

Operating expenses were up single digit despite higher fixed operating costs due to lower trading related expenses.

Trading related expenses fell 8.8% to Php47.3 Mil due to lower trading activity.

Meanwhile, fixed operating expenses increased by 7.9% due to higher personnel costs and professional fees, higher rentals and utilities, and advertising and marketing brought about by rising inflation and the reopening of the economy. Other expenses were also up mainly due to higher forex losses. This was partly offset by lower communication cost and depreciation expenses.

ROAE Improved to 20.1%

ROAE improved from 11.8% to 20.1%.

Profitability improved as revenues increased, leading to higher margins and asset turnover.

Margins improved as growth in revenues outpaced the increase in operating expenses due to the highly leveraged nature of the stockbrokerage business.

Asset turnover increased due to higher yield on cash and investment securities, more than offsetting the drop in trading volumes.

The improvement and margins and asset turnover was partly offset by the drop in leverage as stockholders' equity increased by a faster pace compared to liabilities.

Comparative Performance (COL vs. PSE)

Rank Slips to Number 11

COL's average daily turnover fell 27.3% to Php491.1 Mil. This was steeper than the PSE's 16.9% decline as value turnover of local investors fell by 45.3% Y/Y.

COL's market share in terms of value turnover also fell to 4.0% for the whole market from 4.6% during the same period last year. This was largely due to the increase in foreign investors' share of total value turnover to 52.3% from 40.1% Y/Y. There were also special block sales that were transacted by brokers that have special relationships with listed companies. Nevertheless, COL's share of local value turnover still increased to 9.7% from 7.3%.

Due to the lower value turnover, COL's rank slipped to number 11 from number 5.

Change

Strong Balance Sheet

Cash & cash equivalents fell slightly by 8.2% to Php9.7 Bil. This was largely due to the decline in customers' excess cash position and the reallocation of more funds to HTM investments.

Trade receivables fell by 26.2% to Php880.0 Mil. This was largely due to the 4.8% decrease in margin loans to Php857.8Mil. However, receivables from the clearing house also fell by 90.5% to Php10.9 Mil while receivables from other brokers dropped by 75.6% to Php11.6 Mil.

The drop in cash and receivables was largely responsible for the 5.8% decline in total assets.

Trade payables decreased by 9.1% to Php9.9 Bil. This was mainly due the drop in customers' excess cash position.

Stockholders' equity was up by 10.6% to Php2.2 Bil due to the booking of Php418.4 Mil in profits, partly offset by the payment of Php199.9 Mil in cash dividends. BVPS likewise increased to Php0.455/sh.

Despite its smaller asset base, COL's balance sheet remained strong with ample cash and no interest bearing debts.

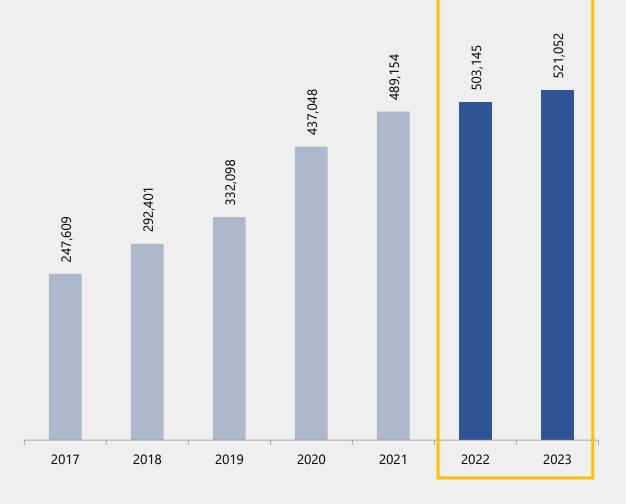

Average monthly additions reached 1,492 during the past 12 months.





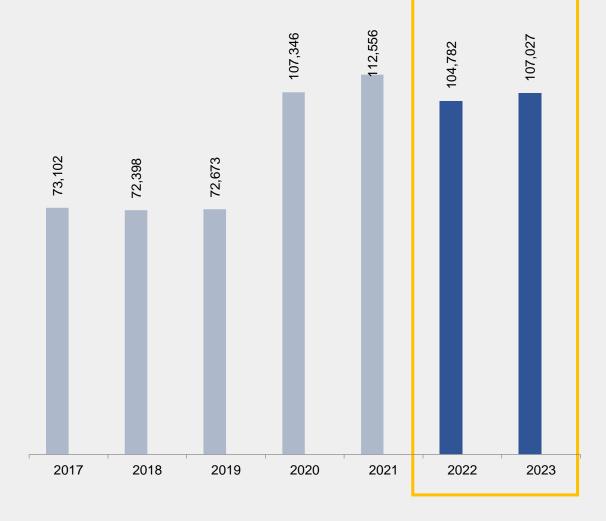
Client Equity (Php Mil)

Client Equity Up on New Deposits

Client equity was up 2.1% Y/Y to Php107.0 Bil.

Client equity increased largely due to new deposits. Note that the PSEi index was down by 1.8% Y/Y. However, COL registered a net cash inflow from retail clients amounting to Php1.4 Bil during the past twelve months.

Margin Loans Up

Average daily margin loans increased by 22.5% to Php930 Mil Y/Y.

The number of approved margin accounts fell slightly from 1,166 to 1,118. The number of accounts utilizing margin was also down from 32.1% to 30.4%. However, the value of margin line utilized increased from 13.4% to 16.4%, explaining the increase in average daily margin loans.





MF Net Sales still Positive due to Bond, Feeder, and CMI Managed Funds

COL's MF distribution business still generated net sales of Php225.6 Mil in 2023 despite the challenging operating environment. This was due to the popularity of bond funds, feeder funds and the newly launched CMI managed equity funds. Excluding money market funds, net sales amounted to Php208.9 Mil.

Bond funds accounted for Php65.5 Mil of total net sales, while feeder funds accounted for Php114.9 Mil.

CMI managed equity funds generated Php122.2 Mil in net sales.

Balanced funds suffered from net outflow amounting to Php11.8 Mil. Non-CMI managed equity funds also suffered from a net outflow of Php81.9 Mil.

MF only Clients Up Slightly

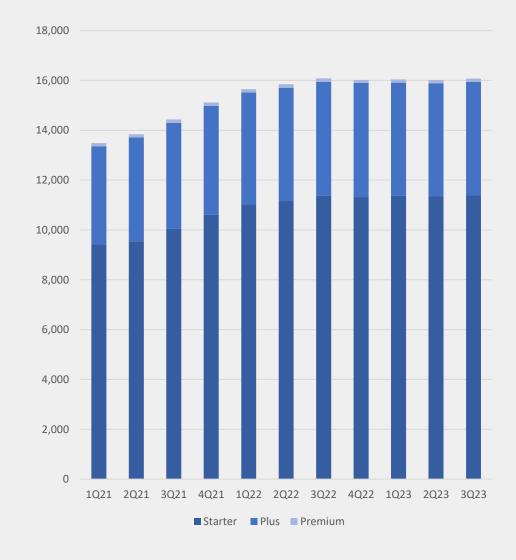
The number of clients who only owned MFs increased slightly from 16,022 as of end 2022 to 16,078 as of end 2023.

Of the said number, 70.9% were Starter clients while 28.3% were Plus clients.

However, clients who had MF investments fell from 64,582 as of end 2022 to 64,64 as of end 2023.

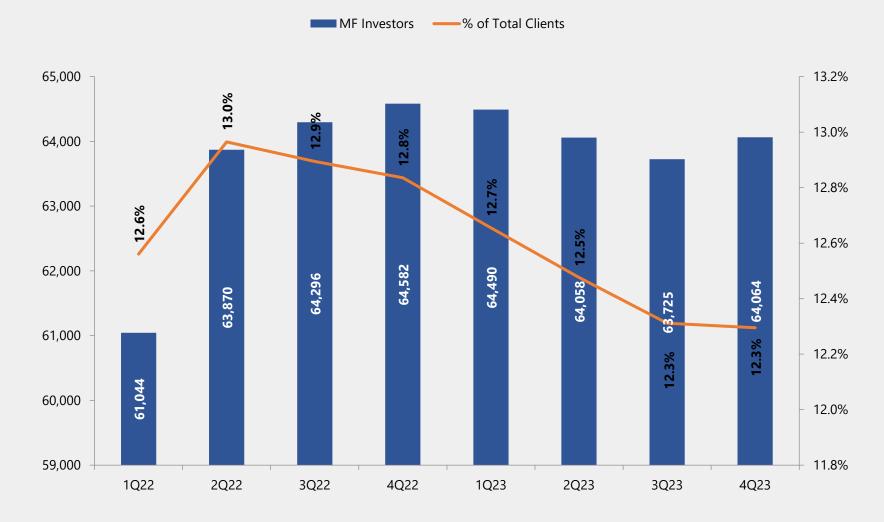
Of the said number, 31.4% were Starter clients while 61.2% were Plus clients. Premium clients accounted for 7.3%.
